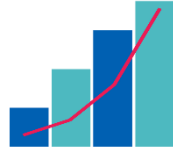
## Outcome 1

People of all ages with a learning disability and their families are living good lives.



## What will be different for who?

- People with a learning disability are not dying too soon
- People with a learning disability are part of their community
- People with a learning disability and their families have enough to live on and are valued and paid the same as others for the roles they hold and the jobs they do
- There are self-advocacy groups in every area with a quality mark in place
- LDE is influencing how the public view and understand the lives of people with a learning disability
- People who use social care have support plans that talk about what they want for the future and they know how much money they have to make this happen.
- There is someone in Government whose job it is to make sure people with a learning disability have good lives



## What LDE is doing and using to know if these things are happening?

- Making sure everyone knows the life expectancy for people with a learning disability.
- Understanding what the life expectancy data and trends are showing over time (i.e., whether things are getting better or not)
- Showing others what good looks like and measuring this, based on the Good Lives framework. For example, using a Good Lives survey to make sure that people's happiness and wellbeing is getting better.
- Using the self-advocacy map to make sure that self-advocacy groups are still going, and people know about them across the country
- Working with providers and commissioners to ensure that people's support plans focus on what matters most to them

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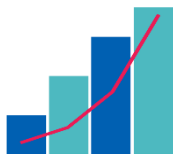
## Outcome 2

The way that people and society feel, think and behave towards people with a learning disability has changed for the better



## What will be different for who?

- The public, the media, the governments, providers and commissioners have the same goals and want positive change.
- There is more trust in people and families: people are listened to, respected, valued and included
- People of all ages with a learning disability are speaking up and a part of change in their own lives and beyond
- Things that are written down in law or as guidance are clear about what needs to change and what happens if change doesn't occur
- People are working in different ways so that people with a learning disability feel respected, confident and understood. Including people in Government and decision makers.



## What LDE is doing and using to know if these things are happening?

- Going against negative attitudes towards people with a learning disability and supporting positive ones
- Writing down how things are now so it's clear when and how things have changed
- (Linked to outcome 1 above) Tracking data that shows things are changing, including attitudes towards and visibility of people with a learning disability
- Looking at national and local policies to see if they are clear about the need for change, so that people with a learning disability have equal lives and life chances
- Talking about the diverse stories of the good lives people are living and what makes that happen
- Helping people of all ages and backgrounds with a learning disability to use their voice

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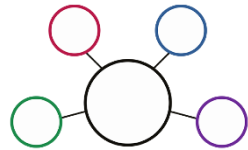
## Outcome 3

- We are showing what a “rights-based approach” looks like and are showing others how it’s done
- We learn from when organisations are, and are not, supporting people’s rights
- LDE is taking action to support and challenge local partnerships, services and staff teams to achieve change and influence Governments to do the same.



## What LDE is doing and using to know if these things are happening?

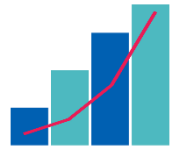
- Feedback from and wider surveys/work done by LDE partners e.g., BIHR
- Link to Outcome 1 e.g. A Good Lives survey includes a question about knowing your rights
- LDE news, stories and publicity has a clear rights-based focus that shows our vision, values and the Good Lives Framework
